The club had, for some time, allocated funds to a water project from Supurunda in PNG, for which a Global Grant was being arranged. In effect, it took about 13 months to get the project approved, and six weeks to complete. It was an amazing project, and all villagers helped in its completion. There was dancing in the streets when people finally had fresh running water on tap. It gives us a thrill to see these projects come to fruition. There are about five more similar projects in line for approval and completion.

Funds for these projects, as always, were raised by the efforts of members at the usual events. Bunnings, Pine Rivers Show are the regulars. This year we assisted with parking and ran our van at a new Garden Fair held at the show grounds. The event was moderately successful for us, however we kept our name in front of the community. We also supported the Moreton Bay regional Council's Aussie Arvo on Australia Day at the Lawnton Aquatic Centre. We joined with the Albany Creek club to sell pop corn and fairy floss - now there is a messy job!

We ran two good District Grant projects. One involved donating cricket equipment to the Brumbies Blind Cricket Association. In the other project we donated storage shelving to Pine Rivers Meals on Wheels, as they were running out of storage space. Funds were also donated to the Choir of Hard Knocks, Alzheimers Australia, and MND and Me. The latter included a few projects we were involved in.

Our Police Officer of the Year night was well supported, and MP Nikki Boyd again supported the event with a donation. Senior Constable Kerri Edwards from the Mango Hill North Lakes Station was the winner this year. We congratulate all the nominees.

The Rose Craig Bursary was won by Kristen Burey, who had attended Bray Park State High School, and was studying a Law/Business Honours Degree at QUT. It was also wonderful to welcome Rose's daughter Sherryl back to our club and she presented the bursary to Kristen. She then shared some personal memories of her mother and enlightened the club about how Rose had striven to live her life - "Work hard, be kind, value your friends. Later, all were enthralled with their experiences at the Forum, and their inspiration was evident in their presentations to the club afterwards.

We were also very proud to acknowledge that Bethany Conroy, who attended NYSF in 2017, had been selected to attend the London International Youth Science Forum, based at Imperial College, London, in August 2018. Bethany graduated Year 12 with the Academic Gold Achievement Award (DUX) and has gone on to study engineering at QUT with a scholarship. She is a very motivated student who helped the District Committee with the interview process for the 2018 NYSF candidates. In April, Bethany approached the club for a donation towards the cost of attending in London and the club generously donated \$500 plus the proceeds of a Bunnings Sausage Sizzle that Bethany manned with her dad, Mike and her friend Andy in June. We heard that Bethany had a wonderful time when we heard her presentation on return.

Another Rotary initiative that continues to be very popular with the club is the Rotary International Youth Exchange Programme.
